From the Pastor

I sit writing this article planning on going into Walker State prison on Thursday. I truly enjoy my prison ministry. One of the most amazing things is how many men I have actually seen come to Christ. Perhaps I am too flippant about it, but it is true that I have encountered dozens of men on Thursday afternoon, who come in with an attitude and a machismo that says I'm only here for the free cookies. Our ministry is not to convert people or to promote any particular denomination. Our ministry is to let incarcerated men meet Jesus, often for the very first time, and to let them know that God loves them. One of the things we say all of the time is that our motto is listen, listen, love, love.

I literally have lost count of the men who by Saturday afternoon realize for the first time that God actually loves them. God loves them in spite of whatever they've done.

It made me wonder how many of us might actually doubt the fact that God loves us, or at the very least the extent of God's love for us. As a pastor, I've had many people start a conversation like this. Well, I know God loves people. But, you don't know what I've done.

Well, let's look at some of the people Jesus forgave. Jesus forgave Levi, a tax collector. Tax collectors made their living by cheating people, forcing them to pay more taxes than they actually owed and pocketing the difference. We know this tax collector, better by his other name, Matthew, one of the twelve.

Jesus allows a sinful woman to pour perfume on his feet and rub it with her hair. When it is pointed out, Jesus announces that the woman has done good, and his host has neglected his responsibilities of hospitality, and he turns to the woman and forgives her sins.

Jesus forgave, a woman caught in adultery. Not accused, caught. No matter, what else might be true or what facts, her accusers omitted, the woman was guilty of adultery. Jesus forgave her, told her to sin no more and sent her on her way.

Then there's Peter. One of Jesus' closest friends and followers. The man always mentioned first in the three closest disciples, Peter, James, and John. Peter denied, knowing Jesus, he abandoned him. And Jesus forgave him, and restored him to his place in the twelve.

Jesus forgave, everyone involved in his crucifixion. Asking the father to forgive them, because they did not know what they were doing.

During his crucifixion, the thief to his side, ask Jesus to remember him when he came into his kingdom. Jesus promised the thief would be with him that very day in paradise.

Saul, who became known better as Paul, was out persecuting followers of Jesus to the point of prison and death. On the road to Damascus. He was knocked from his horse and struck blind, but ultimately he was forgiven, and became the most prolific writer in New Testament history.

I could go on and on and on, but I will finish with this. Moses was a murderer.

God is not looking for a reason to strike us dead. What God is looking for is our willingness to have a relationship with him.

So I would ask you the same question we ask the inmates, are you a friend of God? Is a friend someone who agrees with everything we say and do all the time?

A true friend is someone who wants the best for us. A true friend will call attention when we are about to do something really dumb. A true friend will give us time and space when we need it, but who will also be there with us even when we've made a complete mess of things.

If you just read the description of the people that Jesus forgave, that God forgave, I think it is obvious that dad wants to be our friend.

Adam and Eve were created for the express purpose of having companionship with God. Genesis describes God visiting the garden in the cool of the afternoon, walking and talking with his creation. Even when we screwed everything up, God didn't abandon us, he sent Jesus into the world to correct the problem.

Too many heaven bound Christians think that God doesn't care about them at the best. They cannot believe that God sincerely wants to be in friendship with them.

I have a lighthearted expression that I use that says, "I know God loves you, but I'm one of his favorites because he has my picture on his refrigerator." If you know me at all, you know that I do not believe there is anything special about me to attract God in my direction. I am a mess, but the God that I worship and love cares so much about me that I sincerely believe if he had a refrigerator my picture would be on it. I believe he wants to have your picture on his refrigerator too.

None of us are worthy of God's love. But he loves us anyway. Each one of us is a bearer of the image of God, and he takes great joy in seeing how we reflect his image into the world. Would you let go of your pride and accept God's love and friendship?

I can do what I do, because I truly believe in the love of God and his desire to have a relationship with me.

How about you?
