From the Pastor

Background noise helps me sleep. As many of you know, I'm deaf in my right ear from surgery to deal with vertigo. Back then, the most successful procedure with the fewest side effects was to pack a poison around the nerve for the center of balance. The only question was where. Inside the eardrum was my choice, although deafness was going to be an after effect. But, trust me it was better than not being able to walk or function normally. A side effect I knew nothing about was hearing phantom noise. When I am trying to go to sleep, I hear people talking. The voices seem to be just beyond my ability to understand the words being said. Sometimes I hear footsteps outside the bedroom door and I have even heard doors opening and closing. To save you the time, no I'm not crazy, at least not for that reason. My doctor explained that with no input from that ear, my brain creates its own inputs.

A simple and easy work around to this issue is to have some form of background noise. I used to leave the TV playing, but eventually that got annoying to Dossie. Technology has been a blessing, because I can now put a Bluetooth headset in my ear and boom, I'm out. One of the funny events involving this technology happens when the battery runs down on the headset. Each headset is different, but all of them let you know before they turn off. Some say, "low battery", repeatedly. That will wake you up, I promise. One model announced, loudly, "battery low, headset will disconnect now. That now was said in the same tone of voice that the PA system used when you needed to evacuate the building. Again, trust me, it's hard to fall back asleep when you think you might need to leave the building.

Back in the day, I used to listen to MASH episodes to fall asleep. I've seen most of the episodes dozens of times, because MASH played on most of the cable systems practically round the clock. One episode still stands out in my mind. It was nearing Christmas and Major Winchester, following a family tradition donated chocolates and toys to the local orphanage. His family, a wealthy New England clan with deep roots had given chocolates to the working class families, many of whom could not afford the luxury of chocolate. During the episode, a North Korean soldier was brought in and he was carrying some of the expensive chocolate the Major had donated. Major Winchester was livid and confronted the head of the orphanage about his betrayal. Turns out, the head master had sold the chocolate for enough money to provide food for the children for a year.

Reality crashed in on the Major, who begged forgiveness for being upset that dessert was not given to children who didn't have food.

I have had that experience, not to the degree shown on MASH, but the same awakening. In the first church I served, I went to the principal of the elementary school nearest the church, and asked point blank what the students needed. Everyone was donating pencils, paper, even backpacks, and I don't know what I expected to hear, but it wasn't what I actually heard. She said, we need socks, underwear and sweatpants for the kids. School starts for children young enough that some aren't ready and have accidents. Some kids literally had no shoes or socks and some came in the only clothes they had every day.

It's easy and requires little thought to give kids paper, and paper would certainly be useful. But it misses the whole point of being the church. We are called to be the hands and feet of Christ to the world, starting in our own backyard.

It's the same with the backpack ministry, giving nutrition to kids who might otherwise go hungry over a weekend. Are there some kids given bags who might not actually need them, sure! But we are the church, our mission is not to judge whether someone is worthy of our help. Our mission is to show the extravagant love of God to a world that doesn't know and maybe hasn't heard of God.

Look at the first miracle of Jesus. Turning water into wine at a wedding. Would anyone die from a lack of wine? NO! What is the worst thing that might result? Social embarrassment! A big deal for the bride and groom and maybe their families. But, no big deal.

That is our God. When God shows up, God shows out. We are not stretching God's limits by feeding kids or providing socks or even giving a band parent an opportunity to actually see and hear their child perform at halftime.

Malachi chapter 3 speaks of bringing the whole tithe into the storehouse and see if God will not pour out blessings on His people. You cannot out bless God. Let's keep being the church and see how and what God has planned for Summerville, Chattooga and our world.

If you have to choose between going to church and being the church, BE THE CHURCH.

Men's Club Meets on September 6th


All Men are invited to meet at Jim's at 8:00 a.m. for breakfast and fellowship. Plan to attend and bring a friend.
