From the Pastor

Is it just me or has much of the world lost its mind? I am not, nor never have been a pacifist. There are things worth fighting for, but almost nothing is worth starting at the point of violence. The type of thing that comes to my mind where violence might be appropriate would be walking up on an abuse or assault in progress.

But, how did we get to the point where disagreeing with someone merits violence? To borrow a title from Francis Schaeffer, **“How should we then live?”**

I start from scripture, Micah 6:8, specifically. Micah 6 is an imaginary conversation between the nation of Israel, that has repeatedly failed to obey God’s Law, as given to Moses. God has pronounced judgement on Israel and Israel asks, What should we do? Gods response,

*To act justly and to love mercy
and to walk humbly with your God.*

I’ll come back to this, but I want you to hear the Message translation.

*what God is looking for in men and women.
It’s quite simple: Do what is fair and just to your neighbor,
be compassionate and loyal in your love,
And don’t take yourself too seriously—
take God seriously.*

To bring this to today, have we been disobedient to God’s will for us? Yes!

What do we need to do? Act Justly, or as the Message translates, do what is fair and just to our neighbors, be compassionate and loyal. Too much of Christianity has made this into a small thing about “social justice”. They’re not wrong, but they aren’t right either. Narrowing “acting justly” this much is like saying three men went to the moon. It’s true, but incomplete. Yes, there are people who have been treated badly, but if we want to honor God, we will look at EVERY aspect of our lives and ask if we are doing what is right or are we doing what is popular. Christianity was always intended to be counter cultural. We are not supposed to “Go with the flow,” we are to present and represent the love and justice of God. Far too many people treat the rich or powerful one way and the waitress at the diner another.

Loving mercy directly flows out of acting justly. I am a huge fan of Les Misérables. The first crime Jean Valjean committed, the one that sets the scene for the entire book is stealing a loaf of bread to feed his sister's starving children. Did he do it? Absolutely. He was guilty as charged. Was it a sin in God's eyes? Maybe, but not as great as allowing children to starve. When I see looters coming out of stores with 55 inch flat screens, I doubt they are taking them for starving children.

Jesus told many truths through parables. The parable of the unforgiving manager is an object lesson in mercy. The manager owed the king ten thousand bags of gold. That's a lot of money. The king forgave the debt because the manager begged him. Later, when the forgiven manager saw a man who owed him one hundred coins, he choked the man and demanded payment. The king handed the unforgiving manager over to the jailers as a result of his unforgiving nature. When we pray the "Lord's Prayer," we say forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. What the prayer literally says is forgive our sins in the same manner as we forgive others.

Walk humbly before God. I like the translation, don't take yourselves too seriously. Humility has been defined as "not thinking less of yourself, but thinking of yourself less.

There are differences in our walks and in our preferences. I am a divorced and remarried man. Many denominations would not allow me to be a pastor. I struggled with my calling for several years, but did make peace with my call. I do not judge the denominations who have different standards than ours, I just do not serve in those churches. As Methodists, we do things in a specific way, that's where the word method—its comes from. Wesley had a method for almost everything. If someone wants us to become a Baptist or Lutheran or Reformed church, that is not going to happen. There are churches down the street that follow those traditions. We would not judge, but we are not going to change how we worship and believe.

That is the key to what I'm trying to say. We don't have to agree, but we must respect each other. The outbreak of violence we see today is a result of failing to be humble and merciful. I disagree with you, that makes you not only wrong, but less than human and not worthy of life.

God created humanity in His image. Everyone bears the imager of the creator God. The meanest person who ever lived bears the mark of the creator. Jesus commanded us to love one another as He loved us. Doing this is how people know we are His disciples.

I'll end with the message translation of Philippians 2:3

If you've gotten anything at all out of following Christ, if his love has made any difference in your life, if being in a community of the Spirit means anything to you, if you have a heart, if you *care*—then do me a favor: Agree with each other, love each other, be deep-spirited friends. Don't push your way to the front; don't sweet-talk your way to the top. Put yourself aside, and help others get ahead. Don't be obsessed with getting your own advantage. Forget yourselves long enough to lend a helping hand.

Go and do likewise.

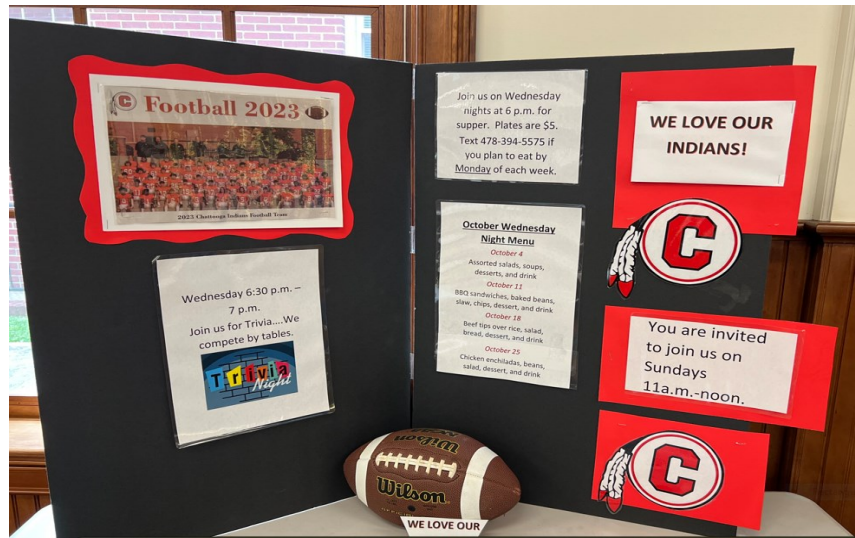
